## **Focus Questions for the General Prologue:**

1. At what time of year does this pilgrimage take place? Why is this a good time of year for such a trip? What sorts of themes, symbols, or ideas are associated with this time of year?				

2. Which pilgrim is described first? What might this suggest about the narrator's attitude toward the character? What words or phrases support your answer?
3. Overall, how does the narrator depict those characters belonging to the old feudal class system? Are any of these characters satirized? If so, whom is satirized, and why?
4. How does Chaucer represent those characters belonging to the religious life? Which characters are satirical, and how so?

5.	As a whole, how are Chaucer's pilgrims of the emergent middle class portrayed? What might Chaucer's satirical goals be in the renderings of these characters?
6.	The narrator, himself, is a member of this pilgrimage. Though he does not give us a direct description of himself, what information can you gather about the speaker through his commentary? What goals does he, as a storyteller achieve in the Prologue? Do you think the narrator is Chaucer or a persona created by Chaucer?
7.	What sort of man is the Host, and what reason does he give for suggesting the storytelling activity? What sorts of stories does he ask the pilgrims to tell? What does this suggest?
